About the MELAB

The Michigan English Language Assessment Battery (MELAB) is aimed primarily at nonnative speakers who require an English qualification for admission to academic programs. It evaluates advanced-level proficiency in English and is widely recognized by colleges, universities, and professional credentialing organizations.

- Accepting the MELAB alongside the TOEFL® or IELTS™ can make your institution more attractive to international students.
- Since 1985, the MELAB has incorporated ongoing developments in assessment and language-testing research to serve the needs of institutions and test takers. The success our recognizing organizations continue to have with the MELAB is testament to its validity and appropriateness.

MELAB test format

The MELAB, a paper-and-pencil test, is designed to measure proficiency in the four basic skill areas: writing, listening, reading, and speaking. It represents, in terms of content and level, the language students will encounter in a North American university setting, and the tasks provide opportunities for test takers to display autonomous, independent, and spontaneous language use.

Format and content of the MELAB

Composition

An impromptu composition on a given topic, which is graded for development of ideas, clarity of expression, and language range and accuracy (30 minutes)

Listening

An audio-recorded test consisting of short questions, short conversations, and extended radio interviews, which test both general and detailed listening comprehension (35 minutes)

Grammar, Cloze, Vocabulary, Reading (GCVR)

110 multiple-choice questions that test the ability to understand and make independent use of academic language (80 minutes)

Speaking test

A face-to-face interaction with an examiner who rates the candidate's overall communicative proficiency (15 minutes)

International students have a choice of proficiency tests to satisfy an English language entry requirement. The MELAB offers an alternative to other high-stakes tests.

Scoring and reporting

The MELAB is administered only by authorized CaMLA examiners at CaMLA-approved test centers.

All score reports provide a complete profile of test-taker proficiency. They include a score for each section of the MELAB as well as an overall score. The MELAB overall score is the average of the scores on the 3 compulsory parts (composition, listening, and GCVR). The speaking test is reported separately.

- Listening and GCVR are scored electronically at CaMLA.
- Writing and speaking are evaluated by CaMLA-trained and certified raters.

A MELAB score . . .

- assesses where test takers place on a proficiency scale ranging from intermediate through advanced.
 Institutions determine which MELAB score is most in line with their specific requirements. They may also decide whether or not to require the speaking test.
- is completed within 6 weeks from the date CaMLA receives the tests, or within 1 week when optional Rush Service is ordered.
- is valid for two years.
